Missouri Natural Resources Conference 2002

The Missouri Natural Resources Conference (MNRC) will be held at Tan-Tar-A from January 30th through February 1st. The 2002 conference planning is well under way and the theme is "*Streams – Dividing and Uniting the Landscape*". There are workshops of interest to all and the facilities at Tan-Tar-A have some beautiful new renovations.

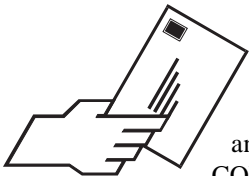

Executive Council Meeting Minutes

August 29, 2001 • Jefferson City, Missouri

Present: **Bob Ball, Gary Baclesse, Diane Bradley, Ross Braun, Pam Cornelius, Joe Dillard, Curtis Gooch, Bob Hagedorn, Andrea King, Craig King, Lynn Leimkuehler, Bev Maltzberger, Mike Morris, Ron Redden, Gary Van De Velde, and Dan Yager.**

✍ **Gary Baclesse**, Chapter President, called the meeting to order at 9:45 am.

✍ **Ron Redden** presented the minutes from the previous executive council meeting that was held on June 15, 2001. There was a motion by **Lynn Leimkuehler** to approve the minutes as presented. The motion was seconded by **Mike Morris** and so approved by the council.

✍ **Joe Dillard** presented the treasurer's report. Total chapter assets beginning on June 16, 2001 amounted to \$19,902.56. Total assets on August 29 amounted to \$17,952.98. During this time total income was \$828.57 and total expenses for the period amounted to \$1,968.15. **Mike Morris** made a motion to approve the treasurer's report as presented. **Dan Yager** seconded the motion and it was so approved.

✍ **Joe Dillard** presented a letter from **David Howard** summarizing his review of the chapter's financial records. David's review covered the period from January 1, 2000 to June 15, 2001. The chapter's saving and checking account information was reviewed. David noted that no accounting errors were found and the balances shown on the bank statements agree with the balances in the chapter books. In his opinion, the treasurer is doing a find job. **Bob Ball** made a motion to accept the financial review. The motion was seconded by **Dan Yager** and so approved.

✍ **Gary Van De Velde** reported on the activities of the committee reviewing the chapter bylaws. This committee is made up of **Gary, Dan Silberberg, and Joe Dillard**. The committee will report to the executive council and the council will review recommended revisions to the bylaws. Gary asked that comments on the bylaws be sent to him. The committee will bring the draft bylaws to the executive council for review at the October meeting. It is planned that the bylaws will be sent to the full membership for approval at the February meeting. **Bob Ball** suggested that prior to the February meeting, the draft bylaws be placed on the chapter website and the membership so notified.

✍ Nominations are being requested for directors for the SWCS's National Board of Directors. Presently, **Dennis Pate** (IA) represents the West North Central Region. **Deborah Cavanaugh Grant** (IL) also serves in an At-Large Director capacity. Nominations are due October 26, 2001. **Bob Hagedorn** made a motion to recommend **Ross Braun** to serve. The motion was seconded by **Lynn Leimkuehler** and so approved. Since Ross is an NRCS employee, he will only accept the nomination if **Roger Hansen**, NRCS State Conservationist, will support the nomination and election to office. Ross will talk to Roger and notify the council if he can accept.

✍ **Gary Baclesse** passed out recently received chapter correspondence among which included our chapter's recognition as **Outstanding Chapter of the Year**. Also included was a request from **Craig Cox** to contact our congressional representatives regarding the Farm Security Act of 2001. **Allan Johnson** has been asked by Gary to contact Representative Emerson. A motion was made by **Curtis Gooch** that a letter be prepared and sent to Senators Bond and Carnahan noting key points the chapter is interested in regarding H.R. 2646. The motion was seconded by **Lynn Leimkuehler** and so approved. **Ron Redden** will prepare the letter for the chapter president's signature.

✍ **Diane Bradley** brought the executive committee up to date regarding actions taken on the chapter's display. Diane, **Bob Ball,**

and **Sarah Minor** have proceeded with display visuals and are still working on a complete panel design. The display was set up during the executive meeting. Diane also indicated she believes that we should develop a chapter brochure. Diane has a member in mind to ask for assistance in setting up the design and information to go in the brochure.

✍ **Bob Ball** referenced the commitment that CARES has to update the website. Bob is still doing minimal updates and is looking for suggestions as to what needs to be changed.

✍ **Ross Braun** indicated that **Lynn King Heidenreich** has resigned from the Scholarship Committee. Committee members now include Ross (as chairman), **Tom DeWitt, Tony Dolmen, Clark Gantzer, and Bev Maltzberger**. A press release and scholarship factsheet were reviewed and comments were offered to Ross.

✍ **Bob Ball** indicated that he had hoped the **Betty Broemmelsick Memorial Scholarship** brochures would be available today but they are not yet printed. Bob plans to meet with the Broemmelsick family and share the brochures with them. It is planned that the brochures will not be available for distribution to the districts until after the Fall Training Conference. Bob has offered to assist the committee that will be formed to identify possible donors for the endowment fund and make contacts. An initial financial advisory committee includes **Bob, Joe Dillard, and Bill Kurtz**.

✍ **Gary Baclesse** addressed an executive council previous decision recognizing a need to develop chapter officer job descriptions. **Diane Bradley** and **Lynn Leimkuehler** offered to serve on the committee. Gary will ask **Dwaine Gelnar** will serve as committee chairman. **Steve Hefner** and **Colleen Meredith** will also be asked to serve on the committee.

✍ **Diane Bradley** brought the executive council up to date regarding planning activities for the Fall Forum. Panelists include **Dan Cassidy, Missouri Farm Bureau; Larry Cieslik, Missouri River Basin Water Management Division; Mimi Garstang, Missouri Department of Natural Resources; Charles Scott, US Fish & Wildlife Service; and Chad Smith, American Rivers – Missouri River Field Office**. A moderator has not yet been selected. The format for the Fall Forum will consist of speaker introductions and prepared remarks followed by a panel discussion with questions to the panelists from the moderator on issues and concerns of the proposed flow regime of the Missouri River. After lunch there will be an opportunity for the audience to direct questions to the panel members. An executive council meeting will immediately follow.

✍ **Gary Baclesse** indicated that there is a need for a financial planning committee. **Dan Silberberg** has been appointed by Gary to serve as chairman on this committee and he will add committee members from the chapter to provide a cross representation of the chapter membership.

✍ **Curtis Gooch** provided a membership report. A list of terminated and new members is attached.

✍ **Mike Morris** asked for nominations for area representatives and other offices for the chapter executive council.

✍ **Gary Baclesse** indicated that members need to be getting suggestions for names for chapter awards to **Dave Johnson**.

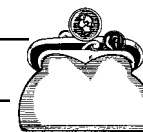

West North Central SWCS Regional Update

One of the objectives of the WNC Leadership Team is to keep local chapters advised of state, regional and national membership trends. As of September 2001 the society at the national level is 437 members short of our targeted goal. Here at the regional level we were 98 members down from what we wanted to be. At the state level we are approximately 20 members smaller than we had predicted. These numbers include membership decline and targeted goals.

This membership decline can seriously effect the SWCS budget at the national level. One thing that all of us can do is to donate to the Combined Federal Campaign under #2330. All of the monies donated will go to the society at the national level.

If we in the Show-Me chapter can meet our membership goal before the first of the year this will mean a \$250.00 cash bonus that can be paid directly to the chapter. If any of you have ideas to increase membership or know of potential members, please give me a call. I still think we can exceed our goal as a chapter, it's just a matter of getting in touch with the right person that knows the way to make this happen.

Members who are interested can now pay their dues online. You can now renew your individual SWCS membership using a **secure** on-line payment through a *PayPal* account!

If you do not have a *PayPal* account, you can set one up on line. This takes approximately three to five minutes - less time than it takes to find your checkbook or a stamp. You can use this account with other vendors that utilize the *PayPal* program.

The Annual Regional Chapter Leadership Development session, sponsored by the WNC Region of the Society will be held March 7 - 8, 2002, in Ankeney, Iowa. Chapter members who are considering future leadership positions in the chapter and members who have held leadership positions within the chapter are encouraged to attend. The session held last year was very informative, I know all will gain something from the experience. All chapter members are encouraged to attend. I will provide additional details, as they become available.

The next West North Central Soil and Water Conservation Society Conference will be held October 8-10, 2002 at the Holiday Inn (Airport) in Moline, IL. "Changing Faces of Conservation and Agriculture—the Future of Working Lands" has been selected as the conference title.

The conference will examine how the changing faces of agriculture and conservation effect working lands in the United States, particularly in the Upper Mississippi River Basin. Fewer and larger farm operations, specialty and niche farming, the conservation provisions of the new farm bill, conservation delivery systems, economic trends and other issues will be discussed.

The conference will include plenary sessions with invited speakers as well as breakout sessions. A call for papers will be issued to invite panelists for breakout meetings, as well as poster sessions. The meeting will include an exhibit hall, as well as after-meeting tours in small boats of the Mississippi River backwaters. I will keep the chapter informed, as additional information becomes available.

In closing, I want to again emphasize the seriousness of this decline of membership within the society. If any of you have ideas on what can be done to reverse this trend, please forward them on to chapter leaders, so they can get the information out to society leaders at the national level.

Fall Forum Overview

“Whose River Is It? Concerns and Issues on the Proposed Flow Regime of the Missouri River” was the title of this year’s Fall Forum held Wednesday, October 17th at the Runge Conservation Nature Center in Jefferson City. Nearly 90 people attend and audience participation was exciting. The forum allowed different views on the proposed flow regime of the Missouri River to be expressed and discussed. Flood control, navigation, irrigation, hydroelectric power generation, municipal and industrial water supplies, water quality, recreation, fish and wildlife, including endangered species and other issues were discussed.



Jerry Carpenter, moderator, presided over the panel discussion. Members of the panel included: (seated left to right) **Mimi Garstang**, Missouri State Geologist and Division Director of the Missouri Department of Natural Resources; **Randy Ashbury**, Executive Director of the Coalition to Protect the Missouri River; **Charles Scott**, Field Supervisor for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service; **Chad Smith**, Director for the Missouri River Field Office - American Rivers; and **Larry Cieslik**, Chief of the Missouri River Water Management Division for the Army Corps of Engineers.

Jerry Carpenter, retired University Extension engineer, served as Forum Moderator. Jerry facilitated the panel and audience dialogue with thoughtful questions and comments. **Larry Cieslik**, Chief, Missouri River Water Management Division for Army Corps of Engineers, led the prepared remarks portion of the forum with the history of the current Missouri flow regime plan and the proposed changes to this plan. **Charles Scott**, Field Supervisor, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, discussed issues and concerns on the significantly altered ecosystem of the Missouri River and how proposed changes could possibly improve habitat for several federally listed endangered, threatened or species of special concern. **Randy Ashbury**, Executive Director of the Coalition to Protect the Missouri River, represented viewpoints of the many diverse interests of agriculture, navigation, industrial, utility, and business-related entities. He explained to the group that the Coalition supports responsible management of Missouri River resources and the maintenance of congressionally authorized purposes of the river including flood control and navigation.

Mimi Garstang, Missouri State Geologist and Division Director, represented the Missouri Department of Natural Resources’ viewpoints for the Geological Survey and Resource Assessment. Mimi presented DNR’s position as one that is pro-environment and pro-river and is based on a more holistic approach than that proposed by others. She agreed that there is a need to restore habitat for endangered species, but DNR also believes multiple river uses can coexist and prosper. Our last forum panelist **Chad Smith**, Director for the Missouri River Field Office – American Rivers, represented a conservation viewpoint to promote the natural, recreational, and cultural values of the Missouri River. This would allow a string of restored natural areas along the Missouri, sustain fish and wildlife, and boost recreation and tourism opportunities.



The proposed plan to change the flow regime of the Missouri River as you can see has hit a few snags along the way. This could have an impact on the many uses of the river system and continues to raise many concerns and issues that will need to be addressed in the future. The Missouri River has been highly modified to serve the basins population and economy. Cost-effective approaches to conserving and rehabilitate the river’s fish and wildlife population while maintaining current benefits will be difficult but possible to achieve. The debate continues to center on the control of water and people working together to protect this great natural resource.

Our sincere thanks to the Missouri Farm Bureau Federation for providing refreshments and the Missouri Department of Conservation Runge Nature Center for allowing us to use their facility for the day event.

✍ **Gary Baclesse**, Chapter President, called the meeting to order at 2:15 p.m. After a brief discussion of the Fall Forum activities that had taken place earlier in the day, it was suggested that a video copy of the Fall Forum be provided to the US Army COE to better document the public participation and interest noted today.

✍ **Ron Redden** presented the minutes from the previous executive council meeting that was held on August 29, 2001. There was a motion by **Mike Morris** to approve the minutes as presented. The motion was seconded by **Craig King** and so approved by the council.

✍ **Joe Dillard** presented the treasurer's report. Total chapter assets beginning on August 30 amounted to \$17,952.98. Total assets on October 17 amounted to \$16,653.47. During this time total income was \$626.68 and total expenses for the period amounted to \$1,926.19. **Bob Ball** made a motion to approve the written report as amended by Joe. **Mike Morris** seconded the motion and it was so approved. Joe mentioned that the chapter's sales tax exemption had recently been approved and the new expiration date is now August 29, 2006.

✍ **Allen Johnston** reported that over 400 society members have dropped their memberships nationally and that of these 98 are located in our West North Central (WNC) Region. Allan asked for ideas on how we might get new members. It was indicated that membership should be promoted to NRCS employees. **Craig Cox's** recent work with NACD and the Farm Bill demonstrates the beneficial work this organization had done in just the last year. Craig has indicated that he wants to keep the society as a professional organization. A reduced number of FTEs may be accounting for part of the reduced membership. It was noted that by limiting the membership to professionals, we are missing the opportunity to bring in others to our organization that share and believe in our cause. Examples include teachers and farmers.

✍ **Gary Baclesse** mentioned that **Raleigh Redman** has talked to him about the possibility of working with the Central Missouri State University to organize a student chapter.

✍ It was suggested that a copy of the membership be provided to **Roger Hansen, Scott Totten, and George Seek** to show the involvement that each of their respective employees has taken by joining in the SWCS.

✍ **Allan Johnson** mentioned WNC Leadership Development Workshop will be held in Ankeny on March 7-8, 2002 and that the
